# **David's Sin Ripples Through History**

I posted an essay on the Livestream page that names and connects many of the men attached to David and Bathsheba...good and loyal men that were betrayed and disappointed by the actions of a couple that surely knew better.

I traced the first major ripples of this one action as they played out in David's own life and in his reign as King of Israel... ripples that affect history right down to today's news.

When Moses reviewed the Covenant with Israel just before they crossed the Jordan into The Land of Promise in the first half of Deuteronomy 28, the whole tenor of the Covenant suggests that God's intent was for Israel to be established as a prominent and lasting powerhouse of stability in the Middle East...the very area that is in the news today, and indeed, has been for three thousand years.

The blessings of health, wealth, stability and control came into sharp focus in the last years of Saul's reign and the early years of David's reign. Indeed, Israel was the Alpha-Power in the Levant and poised to become all that God had intended in the Covenant.

Instead, David destroyed his credibility among his men and his own sons. The last half of David's reign was riddled with infighting and palace intrigue, and he handed the throne to Solomon, who relaxed the expansionist foreign policy, focused on comforts and glamour, and heavily taxed the people to support the massive

infrastructure even though he collected vast wealth from vassal states. Forty short years of his reign later, he handed his son, Rehoboam, a nation in civil war, idolatry, with withering borders and influence. The ripples continue on through the rest of the Old Testament narrative and eventuate in Israel as first an Assyrian, then Babylonian Subject. Persia and then Greece held Israel as a vassal state, and the New Testament narrative continues with Israel under the heavy hand of Rome...all because of the events that David set in motion when he had Bathsheba brought to his bed.

"But Darrell," you say, "that's an awful lot of consequence to lay at the feet of one man!" And it is. True enough, lots of other men added their own set of sins and rebellion to that of David...but the fact remains that David flaunted the Law and Covenant and taught his sons and others to do the same.

Would Israel have stayed true to the Law and Covenant if David had not sinned? The question and discussion is academic because we know the propensity of men to sin...but God did promise that Israel would be blessed, continue to be blessed, and be a blessing if they had kept the Covenant. Was, is, God in the business of making promises that he has no intention of keeping? Does he require actions that his people cannot perform? Again, I understand the discussion is academic.

Just because we can...Rome, as the Byzantine Empire, fell to the rising Islamic

pressures in the last half of the first millennium AD and the rest is history, as they say, and we see constant wars and power struggles by all sorts of parties and treaties trying to fill the power vacuum left by David's Israel so many years ago.

As we watch current events unfold in The Land that was promised to Abraham's people under the Covenant...with all of the global repercussions...we would do well to consider the relatively small sins and choices of our own lives and the ripples they may cause through millennia of history should God continue to let the clock run. David committed adultery initially...a sin that is commonplace today and no less destructive to families and trusting counterparts...and look at the ripples through history! We may never sin so flagrantly or be noted in history books for our choices...but we do have responsibility and accountability to generations yet to be born.

"How can a young person stay on the path of purity? By living according to your word. I seek you with all my heart; do not let me stray from your commands. I have hidden your word in my heart that I might not sin against you.



That's a lot of ANDs...maybe it is time to include others into my wintertime.






